

Dear Friend,

Storms, floods, trees uprooted, several people killed – surely it couldn't get worse?

Then we hear about Russian aggression towards Ukraine, and see the frantic efforts of our Prime Minister, President Biden and European Heads of State, for a coordinated and escalating attack on Russian banks and individual oligarchs, until hostilities cease and a withdrawal is achieved.

Yet in the midst of this turmoil and anxiety, winter continues to move towards Spring. The gardens are full of snowdrops and crocuses, daffodils are beginning to appear in sheltered places. The Snowdrop Cross that the local churches planted on Rastrick Common 22 years ago, is looking lovely and still holding its shape, though the Crocus Crosses we planted at the same time in front of St. Matthew's and on the hillside at Upper Edge have almost disappeared.

After the darkness of a long winter, Spring is stirring in the depths and pushing through. Ground that looked bare and dead was actually sheltering vibrant life and growth.

We are approaching the season of Lent - five weeks of preparation leading up to the agony and the joy of Easter. People often give something up for Lent - biscuits, chocolate or alcohol. Others try to give up grumbling or criticising, and some even choose to give money or goods to a charity, a food bank or a good cause weekly during this period. All of us need to pray more earnestly for a just peace on the world stage.

Those who are Christians follow the Gospel story of how Jesus, the young Lord of Life, followed his call and set his face towards his destiny in Jerusalem at Passover time.

First there was the healing of a beggar who had been blind since birth. Jesus wanted everyone to be able to 'see' in a new way. Then came the encounter with a cheating tax collector, who climbed a tree to see the Lord, and ended up entertaining him in his own home, and giving away a huge chunk of his fortune to anyone he had wronged. Transformation.

Next was Jesus's entry into Jerusalem riding on a donkey, not as a conquering hero, but as the Prince of Peace, hailed by joyful, laughing people waving a forest of palm branches.

Not long afterwards, his disciple Judas offered to betray Jesus to his enemies, the Chief priests, and took his opportunity at the Last Supper where Jesus and his disciples met in an Upper Room to celebrate the feast of the Passover. As Jesus broke bread and shared the wine, he asked them to remember him, and declared that his body would be broken and his blood shed, just like the bread and wine, to make us right with God.

Afterwards, in the Garden of Gethsemane, Judas betrayed him with a kiss, and Jesus was taken into custody, questioned, whipped and beaten. His disciples went into hiding, and one of them, Peter, denied knowing him 3 times.

On 'Good' Friday, that strangely-named day, when the Prince of Life was crucified to bring us to God, he died in agony on the cross to save us all and was laid in a tomb, sealed by a mighty stone.

It seemed like the end of the world to his bewildered followers.

But on the third day as dawn broke, when the women went to the tomb to anoint his body, they found the stone rolled away and saw angels who asked them 'Why do you seek the living among the dead? HE HAS RISEN!'

This is the Glory and Joy of Easter Day.

Do come and celebrate Jesus's victory over death at our Easter service, led by the Young Church and Lorraine, 10.30am on Easter Sunday, 17th April.

In Loving Memory of Mrs. Christine Denise Withers 24.12.1945 - 20.01.2022

Christine was a very well-known figure in Rastrick, especially among the churches.

She moved here from Nottingham when she and lan were married and spent the rest of her life in Rastrick. She had a high view of faithfulness in marriage and was faithful in all her relationships.

She was a bright and intelligent lady, a deep thinker, a great talker, always trying to find out more and

understand better. She loved discussion groups and joined in United Churches' Lent Groups almost every year.

Her family were the centre of her world and she was a wonderful mother to Vikki and Dianne. Vikki's brain-damage meant she needed a huge amount of care and the family looked after her at home for 30 years before she went into supported living, but by then Christine's arthritis was becoming severe, she was tired and there were signs that a heart valve was not functioning perfectly. She had the severe trauma of Dianne's serious accident 20 years ago and all the hospital visiting that entailed, and even more stress when Dianne had to have a heart operation later. Christine and Ian spent endless hours by her bedside.



Falling over a bollard carelessly left on the pavement outside her house 3 years ago caused a broken hip, and restricted Christine's mobility severely. Covid-19 caused her to stay indoors and her fitness was further compromised, but it was her heart trouble that made her go into hospital in the last week of her life. She had become very weak and breathless and was not fit to have an operation.

Christine was a kind, caring, loyal and generous friend, who kept in close touch and even offered to turn out in the middle of the night if someone was ill or in trouble. She was compassionate and understanding and I never heard her speak ill of anyone.

Christine had associations with New Road Sunday School as it was then, and with St. Matthew's, but she settled with us at Upper Edge, and brought Vikki to services for many years. Christine was baptised here, and one of the hymns she chose for that service spoke of her life:

'Guide me O Thou great Redeemer, Pilgrim through this barren land'

I believe she did regard herself as a pilgrim, always searching for the truth, always seeking God, learning and growing even in difficult and trying times. Like the Hebrew people of the Old Testament, journeying through the wilderness for 40 years, often feeling weak and weary, and sometimes going round in circles, she needed to be upheld by a powerful hand.

She was thirsty, (as pilgrims often are) for the living water of faith and insight: 'Open now the crystal fountain whence the healing waters flow'.

She believed God was her Deliverer, her Strength and her Shield.

Because I believe she was valiant, I have rewritten some lines of 'He who would valiant be', for her.

She who would valiant be, 'gainst all disaster, Let her in constancy follow the Master.

There's no discouragement shall make her once relent her first avowed intent to be a pilgrim.

Week 3 – Re-write the Stars


Prejudice and injustice in society, dealing with difference, being different. The kingdom values of power in weakness not in wealth or status.

FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT

21 February to 6 March 2022

For two weeks each year at the end of February and start of March, thousands of individuals, companies and groups across the UK come together to share the stories of the people who grow our food and drinks, mine our gold and who grow the cotton in our clothes, people who are often exploited and underpaid.

Last year's Choose the World you Want Festival saw campaigners, shoppers, students and businesses come together in a show of support for the farmers behind our food on the front line of the climate crisis. The COVID-19 pandemic has shown us more than ever how interconnected we are globally. This interconnection is at the very heart of the Fairtrade message and is where your role begins. You are part of the Fairtrade movement, and you have the power to drive long-term change, not only with your shopping choices but with your support in spreading the message.

Since last Fairtrade Fortnight we have seen the G7 and COP26 take place. Over 33,000 campaigners joined 1.8m Fairtrade farmers and workers in backing the Be Fair With Your Climate Promise challenge to world leaders at the UN COP26 summit. But frustration came as the wealthiest nations failed to recognise the urgent need to invest in farmer expertise by delaying their promised \$100bn annual funding to the most climate vulnerable countries until 2023. That isn't good enough.

HOW DOES FAIRTRADE SUPPORT FARMERS IN THE **CLIMATE CRISIS**

Fairtrade is about social, economic and environmental justice. These are built into our standards and drive everything we do. A root cause of the inability to adapt to and mitigate climate change is poverty. More money in the hands of farmers is needed if they are to adapt and survive the climate crisis. Choosing Fairtrade fights for improvements in producers' livelihoods with collective strength through co-ops and their bargaining power, the protection of a Minimum Price and Fairtrade Premiums.

In 2019, Fairtrade also launched an ambitious new living incomes

campaign to lead the way to a sustainable future for cocoa farmers. A living income would provide farmers with a decent standard of living – enough to cover all their cocoa farming costs and enough to cover their basic human rights, like a nutritious diet, children's education and healthcare. Only when they have met these basic needs can they start to meet the challenges of our changing climate.

Easter Egg Tradition

Historically, it was traditional to use up all of the household's eggs before Lent began. Eggs were originally forbidden during Lent as well as on other traditional fast days in Western Christianity (this tradition still continues



among the Eastern Christian Churches). Likewise, in Eastern Christianity, meat, eggs, and dairy are all prohibited during the Lenten fast.

This established the tradition of Pancake Day being celebrated on Shrove Tuesday. This day, the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday when Lent begins, is also known as Mardi Gras, a French phrase which translates as "Fat Tuesday" to mark the last consumption of eggs and dairy before Lent begins.

During Lent, since chickens would not stop producing eggs during this time, a larger than usual store might be available at the end of the fast. This surplus, if any, had to be eaten quickly to prevent spoiling. Then, with the coming of Easter, the eating of eggs resumes. Some families cook a special meatloaf with eggs in it to be eaten with the Easter dinner.



One would have been forced to hard boil the eggs that the chickens produced so as not to waste food, and for this reason the Spanish dish Hornazo (traditionally eaten on and around Easter) contains hard-boiled eggs as a primary ingredient. In Hungary, eggs are used sliced in potato casseroles around the Easter period.
