






A New Year Dawns

Dear Friend,

What troubled times we live in. The news is full of floods and mudslides, gun crime in America, oppression in China as young people dare to protest against endless Covid lock-downs, the cruel and heartless war in Ukraine, as the Russians bombard towns and infrastructure and now instruct their troops to use rape as a weapon of war, while here in Britain many are worried about how to cope with the cost of keeping warm as the winter bites, or how they will manage to afford to buy food – and about the flood of migrants landing on our shores, seeking a better life, so we have strikes and queues at foodbanks and the NHS is in danger of being overwhelmed. It's NOT 'Beginning to feel a lot like Christmas!'

Christmas - the birth of Christ Times were troubled then, too. The Holy Land was under Roman occupation. Life was hard. People were poor, but had to travel to their place of birth to register for tax purposes. So a carpenter and his



young, pregnant wife had to undertake the long journey – about 70 miles to Bethlehem, Joseph's home town, so that the Romans could keep tabs on everyone! Mary was already well into her 9th month, so was probably very weary when they arrived, and desperate for some privacy, rest and comfort, but there was no room for them anywhere, except in a stable in the back yard. There, among the cattle, a baby who was to change the course of history, was born –Jesus Christ our Lord. His name means 'God saves'.

On a hillside nearby, some lowly shepherds thought their end had come, as the night sky filled with dazzling light and they saw shining figures who sang 'Glory to God in the highest and Peace to

all on earth.' When they realised that they were still alive, the angel told them to run all the way down to Bethlehem and see the child who was God's own Son. They were filled with joy and couldn't keep this good news to themselves.

We too try to spread the Good News of God's love and generosity. We collect for food banks, we give presents to children whose families are struggling, we share our joy by offering an early Christmas Dinner to all in the community who wish to come and we invite any who need to keep warm to come along to the church hall when we are there, to chat and be comfortable. We pray for you, our neighbours, every week, for blessing and help, and try to keep in touch with you through our Newsletter. Our Services are open to all. Christmas is a time for Light in the darkness and when the church is decorated it does look beautiful. Come and see! Our services are listed in this newsletter, and you are warmly invited to come on in.

By the way, did you know that Bethlehem means House of Bread? Of course that would be where Jesus, the Bread of Life, would be born!

We wish you every blessing this Christmas time. May Christ be born in all our hearts again.



What are 3 countries that don't celebrate Christmas?



Afghanistan, Algeria, Bhutan, North Korea, Libya, Mauritania, Sahrawi Arab Democratic Republic, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, Tajikistan, Tunisia, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, and Yemen do not recognize Christmas as a public holiday.

In what country was Christmas banned?

In 1644 Christmas was banned in **England**. It was during a time of turmoil and change in England. Christmas as a holiday or celebration was completely banned across the country

Which country cancelled Christmas for 30 years?

In 1969, Castro cancelled Christmas altogether, so that celebrations wouldn't get in the way of the sugar harvest. **Cub a** was officially an atheist nation and the Christmas ban lasted until December of 1997.

Which country celebrates Christmas twice?

Even though the country has a Muslim-majority population, **Egypt** comes together to celebrate this special Christian holiday. But with many different Christian denominations, including Coptic Orthodox Christians, Christmas in Egypt gets to be celebrated twice, on both December 25th and January 7th.









Why We Put an Angel on Top of the Christmas Tree

The reason dates back to the very first Christmas.

If you celebrate Christmas, you've likely seen people top their <u>Christmas trees</u> with decorative angels. But have you ever wondered why we do this or how it became <u>a Christmas tradition</u>?

And why an angel, and not just another ornament?

It turns out, this practice comes from the original Christmas story. Angels play a significant part in the first Christmas: Angels visited Joseph and the Virgin Mary about the upcoming birth of Jesus, and on the night of his birth, angels appeared in the sky over Bethlehem to announce his arrival to the world.

Because angels appeared high in the sky on the first Christmas, people began placing angels high on the top of their trees as a way to celebrate the birth of Jesus. If you've ever seen a star on top of a Christmas tree, there's a similar significance: According to the Christmas story, in addition to angels, the star of Bethlehem (also called the Christmas star) appeared in the sky to guide people to baby Jesus.






