Dear Friend,

Journeying through Lent

Travel blogs and programmes are very popular. They are often presented on TV by well-known 'celebrities' who week by week take us on a journey of discovery. This journey may be in a faraway place we dream of visiting or a more local area that we have spent time in. It may feature travelling by foot, rail or ship. It will invariably involve meeting other people and listening to their life stories. As we travel along with our chosen celebrities in this way, new experiences are opened up and new understandings are given.

All of this reminds me of the journeying we will do as Christians in the five weeks that lead up to Easter. The period we call Lent. Traditionally, it's a time of reflection. A period when we think about the journey Jesus made towards Good Friday and Easter Sunday. In this period, discipleship and prayer are often at the centre of our reflections.

This year, with all that is occurring in our world and which may be occurring in our lives as Christians, I want to encourage us to reflect what Lent means for us and what God may be saying to us.

Many years ago I bought a small devotional book by Joyce Huggett called, *"Finding God in the fast lane."* It spoke into the busy life I was leading and gave me great encouragement on my faith journey. I was reminded that God was near and wanting to speak to me in and about all the things that I was involved in and were part of my life. That life was a journey, was nothing new, but that God was close and sharing that journey with me, speaking life-giving words of encouragement and help was.

In Lent I will read Finding God in the fast lane again. Here are some

of the pointers for growing in God that are given in the book, which I believe offers encouragement to us all:

- Move out of the fast lane. We can hear God more clearly when we travel slowly and make frequent stops in order to encourage stillness.
- Feast on God's goodness and grace. Lent is often just perceived as a time for giving things up, but the whole purpose of that is to draw nearer to God.
- Nurture faith, hope and love. Drawing nearer to God in reflection and stillness will bring transformational changes to our lives and church communities through the way we become deeply aware of his presence and word to us.

Psalm 119 vs 113b, in the Message translation, sums this up by saying, "*You are my place of quiet retreat: I wait for your word to renew me.*"

However you choose to journey through Lent, may it be a rich time of renewal for you and our church community at Upper Edge.

In Loving memory of Helen Kitching, who died peacefully on 10th February 2023, aged 86.

Helen came from Pudsey. She was a bright child and passed for Pudsey Grammar School, where she was to meet her future husband, Colin, in the year above her. As her family was poor she was needed as a wage-earner, so she left school at 16 and became a wages clerk at English Electric in Bradford and trained in office work. Her first date with Colin was on Christmas Eve when they went to a dance at Pudsey swimming pool.



Colin had a brilliant mathematical brain,

and while he studied in Nottingham for his University degree, gaining First Class Honours, Helen carried on working.

They married, and when he became head of the Maths Department at Mexborough Grammar School, they moved to Old Denaby.

They were baptised together when they were in their twenties and joined Pudsey Baptist Church. They were blessed with two children, Kathryn and Graham, both of whom were taught maths by their Dad, and both of whom have careers in insurance and consulting. Helen, in her thirties, took the brave step of training to teach. She had a long and happy career at Sandhill School in Rawmarsh where she taught maths and music and counted many of the families of her pupils as lifelong friends.

At this time, when churches were trying to reach out into the community, Helen and Colin with a few other couples from Conisbrough Baptist Church, became Church Planters, starting a church in a pub in Mexborough. This venture proved very successful and was the beginning of Mexborough Baptist Church. As Arkela, Helen also worked with the Cubs and Scouts.

She was also heavily involved in local politics as Chair of the Local Constituency Labour Party.

It was a blessing to us that after retirement, Colin and Helen decided to move to West Yorkshire, near to the motorway, and within easy reach of Manchester so they could easily visit Graham's family in America, and near where Kathryn, Will and Teddy lived. They enjoyed their grandchildren. They found Upper Edge Baptist Church by accident, and became active members and Deacons, and Helen, who proved to have a wonderful grasp of finances, became our Treasurer. For many years they held a Home Group in Bramble Grove, which was a great blessing to all who came, and where people felt free to share their experiences and their faith.

Their gift of faith and hospitality continued right up until Helen fell ill a few weeks ago and was taken into hospital for assessment. It transpired that she had caught Covid, and her debility and confusion increased.

She went into a Care Home in Great Horton for medical assessment, but her condition continued to deteriorate, and she died there.

She was a stalwart lady of great faith, and a great friend to the church and to those who were close to her. She told me that she prayed for me every day, which was a wonderful comfort in difficult times, and she is sadly missed.

5 Facts About Pancake Day

- Pancake Day is also known as Shrove Tuesday. ...
- Pancake Day is a Christian festival. ...
- It always falls 47 days before Easter. ...
- The name 'Shrove Tuesday' comes from the word 'shriving'.

The first pancake day was in 1445. ...

Shrove Tuesday is a Christian festival celebrated in many countries across the globe. It falls on the Tuesday before the beginning of Lent – a period of around six weeks leading up to Easter. During Lent, Christians give up luxuries to remember when Jesus went into the desert for 40 days to fast and pray. We eat pancakes on Shrove Tuesday as it is the last chance for a spot of indulgence before 40 days of fasting, and also an opportunity to use up food that couldn't be eaten during Lent. This included eggs, fat and milk, which were made into pancakes and eaten on that day.

Shrove is the past tense of the verb shrive, which means "confess one's sins, such as to a priest" (it can also mean "to hear confession"). Shrovetide was once a time that many Christians devoted to confessing their sins before the beginning of Lent.

It is believed that Pancake Day/ Shrove Tuesday started in 1445 in Olney Buckinghamshire, England. A lady was getting carried away with making pancakes when she heard the church bells for the Shrove Tuesday mass. She was late! The lady ran to the church with all of her pancakes and that's where the pancake tradition started.


