We will remember them




They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old.

While waiting at the top, ready to go over the edge, he was given some final safety instructions.

“Just let the rope slide slowly through your hands as it runs through the abseiling device.”

“OK. But, what happens if I take my hands off altogether”, he asked.

“ No worries”, came the reassuring reply. “I’ve got you on the safety line.”

Off he went, abseiling over the edge. As he went down what looked a very long way to the ground it struck me that is what faith is like.

As Christians, we commit ourselves to trusting in the person and promises of God revealed and made known in Jesus Christ. Throughout the Bible we are encouraged to believe that God is totally trustworthy in his love, care and commitment to us. 

When Kaku stumbled across a group of BMS World Mission-supported workers while walking back to his village, he had no idea it would change his life. Kaku lives high in the Nepalese Himalayas and he's part of one of the most marginalised people groups in Nepal . Life for him and his family is incredibly challenging - but because you chose to give, Kaku's life is that bit easier.



When Kaku met the BMS-supported staff, he was curious to learn more about the health and hygiene training they were conducting. As he learnt more about how he could help keep his family healthy and prevent water-borne diseases, Kaku determined to change his life. He was given a hygiene kit - complete with soap, water purification drops, toothpaste and more - and he set about encouraging not just his family, but his whole community, to change their habits and stay healthy.

Who is your hero or heroine?

The other week I was asked to stand up in a service in our church and speak about someone who I looked up to as a hero. I didn't choose a celebrity or a talented sportsman or anyone famous, I chose my Grandma, Laura Hinchliffe. She was and always will be my hero (heroine).



You see, when I was 5 years old my mother got cancer. At that time we were living in Blackpool, my mother was a landlady running a guest house. She had to go in for surgery quicksticks or she would definitely have died. My mum wasn't married, and I would have had to go into foster care or an orphanage. My Grandma came to my rescue. She and my Granddad came and fetched me back to Rastrick, Brighouse. It would have been I imagine on the train - I don't really remember to be honest, but they didn't have a car and if we ever went further than Huddersfield, we always used the train.

When I look back and think about my Grandparents and what they both did for me I'm just so grateful. They were 67 years of age when they took me in and when at age 11, I eventually went back to my mother, they would have been 73!! Those 6 years were the happiest years of my childhood.

My Grandma and Granddad were kind people and I believe kindness is an important trait to have as a Hero or Heroine. They were also selfless, another excellent quality to have. You see I wasn't the first grandchild that they had taken in and looked after - they had my eldest brother for a good number of years as well as my middle brother..... I don't

think my mother coped well with small children.

Siblings disagree on many things but, the one thing my brothers and I would all agree on is how we felt about our Grandparents. Unconditional love.

Our Granddad taught us all (at various times), how to play draughts and he wouldn't let you win, until you did. I was on top of the world the first time I beat him!!



But it was my Grandma that I did most things with, she taught me how to read and write my name. She nurtured me and I always felt safe and secure in my Grandparents home. She also taught me how to make Yorkshire Puddings and we always ate them in the traditional way.... Yorkshire Puddings and gravy for the first course and then your Sunday dinner for the second course. Never together!!

One of the nicest things my mother said to me was that my pastry was as good as my Gran's. Well chuffed.

I remember one time when I was at Longroyde Junior School, I think I was about 9. My teacher Mrs Wilson set us a competition to compose a poem about Autumn. My Gran encouraged (another hero trait), me no end to put one together - and I won!! I won a big bar of Cadbury's Fruit and Nut chocolate. I remember running all the way home with it and racing down the back steps shouting, "we won, we won". We shared it, 2 squares of chocolate each night - my Grandma always used to say "chocolate is good for kids". She always had chocolate or chocolates in her cupboard. Black Magic, Terry's All Gold or Milk Tray, 2 squares or 2 chocolates every night after supper. I was so loved and

cared for.

So, that's what a hero (heroine) is, someone who makes you feel you are not alone.....that was my Grandma.

Someone who inspires you to be the best you can be.....that was my Grandma.

Someone who sacrifices their own life to take in a little lost 5 year old.....that was my Grandma (and Granddad).

My Grandma died when I was 18 and I never got to tell her how much I felt she had done for me. **So, if you have a Hero or Heroine in your life, go tell them before it's too late. Go make their day a little brighter and put a smile on their face.**



What are peat bogs? They are dense areas of wetland filled with partially decayed vegetation. The water-logged conditions and the acidity levels prevents the vegetation from fully decaying when it dies. It builds up slowly over thousands of years to become peat. The peat can be metres deep. They are usually found in the northern hemisphere where there is high rainfall and low drainage. Scotland is home to almost 70% of the UK's peat lands.



Why are peat bogs important? They form some of England's most scarce form of habitat, which provides a unique home for a wealth of plants, animals and insects. They are an important feeding and stopping-off point for native and migrating birds. Due to their age they contain layers of historical data. Healthy peat bogs act as 'carbon sinks' storing huge amounts of carbon. When damaged peat bogs dry out they release carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, which speeds up climate change.

Peat bog destruction For many years peat was removed from peat lands for gardener's to add to their soil. This has dramatically reduced the biodiversity. Due to the length of time for peat to form it is a non renewable source.

How can I help? The easiest thing you can do is to buy peat-free compost. Which is great for the climate and the environment. By swapping to peat free you are preserving our rare and precious peat lands which is vital for the unique biodiversity they support. Or you could make your own free compost at home using a compost bin or heap.


