They say that you can measure a person by the company they keep. I have always wondered whether my friends, when they think upon that comment, look at me, slowly shake their head and try to remember how they ever allowed me in. Friendship is a strange thing, isn't it? As we move through life, we become aware of how important some people are to us, and remember those from the past we have lost contact with.

Recently I have been thinking about a couple of people that fall into the latter category. With one of them I collaborated on a few shows, he wrote lyrics and music for the performances and I added narrative and choregraphed the routines. We would take over a church for a week or so and spend up to 12 hours a day, constantly reworking the show until we felt we had it right. Happy endless days.

At the church was someone else who became a dear friend. Dave was the church caretaker and was in his early 60s when I met him; he had had many jobs throughout his life, but had taken early retirement due to ill health. He was also one of the funniest people I have ever met, always ready with a fantastic story from his life – some of them may even have been true! To him I was "circus man". Over all the years I knew him, I can only recollect him calling me Daryll on a handful of occasions. Because of him, there are still dozens of people that only know me as "circus man". Dave would sit and talk with me for hours in the church and any time I left equipment out he would insist on having a go. I can't begin to explain the terror of seeing a man who has had three major heart attacks attempting to ride the unicycle, walk the tight wire or balance on the walking globe.

He would also constantly move my props around or leave little notes around the church that either offered words of encouragement or critiqued my previous day's practice. Dave was a gruff, belligerent, working class man from Bradford and sometimes his language and turn of phrase would raise eyebrows in the church. To many, I'm sure our friendship would have appeared strange. However, he was also the champion of those he felt were unfairly treated; at his funeral there were people of all ages, genders and sexual orientations; people from almost every cultural group represented in Bradford were there, as were the rich, the poor and the in-between.

Dave was loved by all and could win you over in an instant. If we truly are measured by the company we keep then my desire is to be known as a friend of Dave. My desire for you is that you too have people like that in your life. Those that just seem to drift in and yet manage to leave a lasting impression. May you be a Dave to others too. May the world be populated with Daves.

Threads through Creation

It was Anne who let us know about an amazing exhibition in Blackburn Cathedral in April, so of course we went!

It was showing for only a few weeks and we had never heard of it. Anne explained that it was devised and made by an artist from Devon who specialised in textiles: Jacquie Parkinson – a devout Christian. Now as a non-sewer I wasn't expecting too much but I was bowled over by it.

THREADS THROUGH CREATION took 3 years to complete, and required miles of thread and 8 million stitches. The theme was the Creation Story.

The Cathedral is a lovely light space. There is a crypt below which houses a very nice café and was busy throughout the day. We started with coffee, having set off early and then began the wonder of seeing each of the enormous and beautiful panels mounted around the building.

She depicted the Trinity as a three-stranded spiral, glistening and beautiful. This motif was to be found in almost every panel.

God spoke Light, Water, a Green Earth, a Universe sparkling with lights – and if you looked carefully you could pick out many constellations we recognise in the heavens; Water and sky, full of the creatures that inhabit them, and the earth itself. Adam was black, and Eve fair-skinned and auburn-haired, to show that all peoples are loved by the Creator. Adam held a tiny mouse in his hand, and a white butterfly had landed on Eve's hand to indicate their harmony with nature.

The attention to detail was amazing in each panel and every one was a labour of love. When Satan was introduced into the perfect harmony, the artist depicted him with a sinuous backbone and the mind of a viper, red, black and deadly. Their choice to obey Satan's challenge to God's command not to eat the fruit on the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil caused them to be cast out of their Paradise, but even as they departed, a lamb accompanied them and a white dove hovered overhead – Jesus was known as the Lamb of God, and the dove is known as a symbol of the Holy Spirit.

You will be able to recognise pictures of the panels as Anne has printed them from her phone and displayed them on the notice boards in the church hall.

Apparently this artist has now created three major exhibitions, the latest of which may be on display in Liverpool Cathedral next January, and Blackburn Cathedral is hoping to host all three of her exhibitions some time in 2025. Not to be missed. Watch this space!

Good News

Could you be eating your own clothes?



Our clothes are made of millions of tiny fibres, many of which are plastic. Every time we use our washing machine, microfibres are shed which end up in the environment. The Stop Ocean Threads petition calls on the Government to legislate for it to be mandatory for all new washing machines to be fitted with microfibre filters. This is so much easier than trying to retrofit your machine with a filter, and any cost increase is likely to be relatively small.

Simply fitting these filters could help to tackle this type of plastic pollution at source by significantly reducing the numbers of invisible microfibres being released into your machine's waste water, which then goes on to a water treatment plant and It is estimated that every wash can release 700,000 microfibres; that equates to 10 trillion a week in the UK alone. When these are ingested by fish, they could eventually end up on your dinner plate. Now there's food for thought.

There are lots of things that we can do to limit our individual microfibre footprint, while at the same time prolonging the life of our clothes, reducing the need to buy more new clothes, so you save money and help the environment at the same time.

The list of tips is too long to include in this initial article, but one of the most important things you can



start with is to read the labels on garments when you go shopping. I remember many moons ago being so excited when I found a fleece made from recycled plastic bottles, and thought I was being so environmentally friendly when I bought it! Little did I know!

Although polyester fleece appears to be the main culprit, there are others, including nylon, acrylic and polyamide. The best thing you can do is to try to choose clothes that are made from as near to 100% natural fibres as possible.

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens (Ecclesiastes 3: 1)




Time is a precious thing isn't it?

Here are just a few things that happened on May 4th through the years...

- <u>**1415**</u> Religious reformers John Wycliffe and Jan Hus are condemned as heretics at the Council of Constance
- <u>**1859</u>** The Cornwall Railway opens across the Royal Albert Bridge linking the counties of Devon and Cornwall in England</u>
- <u>1896</u> 1st edition of London Daily Mail (cost halfpenny)
- <u>**1904**</u> Charles Rolls meets Henry Royce at the Midland hotel in Manchester. They go on to form car manufacturer Rolls - Royce
- <u>1904</u> Construction begins by the United States on the Panama Canal
- <u>1932</u> Al Capone enters Atlanta Penitentiary convicted of income tax evasion
- <u>1945</u> German forces in Denmark, Norway and the Netherlands surrender unconditionally to Field Marshall Montgomery at Luneburg Heath

- <u>1972</u> "The Don't Make A Wave Committee," a fledgling environmental organization founded in Canada in 1971, officially changes its name to the "Greenpeace Foundation"
- <u>1979</u> Margaret Thatcher becomes the first woman to be elected Prime Minister of the UK
- <u>2018</u> California overtakes Great Britain to become the world's fifth largest economy
- <u>2023</u> WHO declares Covid-19 over as a global health emergency, but remains a significant threat, with seven million known deaths (real total likely to be 20 million)
