You might have been given a pound coin – or for some of us a pound note – and when you got home with the shopping you were asked for the change. So why the word ‘change’? On the sixth day, I must admit, the Christmas spirit died. The children fought and bickered, we ate turkey rissoles, fried.


On the seventh day of Christmas, my true love he did wince, when he sat down at the table and was offered turkey mince.

So for this newsletter I have chosen the word CHRISTMAS. The target this time is 50 or more.

This good practice for those who will be playing Scrabble over the holiday period!!

Christmas carols are based on Christian lyrics and relate, in the main, to the Nativity. Christmas carols were introduced into church services by St Francis of Assisi in the 12th century.

As for the word carols, “carol” is a derivative of the French word caroller, the interpretation of which means dancing around in a circle. Carol and carols, eventually came to mean not only to dance but included music and lyrics – hence Christmas carolling.

Today Christmas songs and carols are also fast becoming a tradition.

"Silent Night" is about a calm and bright silent night, and the wonder of a tender and mild newborn child, words written in 1816 by a young priest in Austria, Joseph Mohr, not long after the Napoleonic wars had taken their toll.

It was Christmas Eve, 1818, when the now-famous carol was first performed as ***Stille Nacht Heilige Nacht***. Joseph Mohr, the young priest who wrote the lyrics, played the guitar and sang along with Franz Xaver Gruber, the choir director who had written the melody.

The composition evolved, and was translated into over 300 languages with many different arrangements for various voices and ensembles. It was sung in churches, in town squares, even on the battlefield during World War I, when, during a temporary truce on Christmas Eve, soldiers sang carols from home. "Silent Night," by 1914, known around the world, was sung simultaneously in French, German and English.

Today, The Stille Nacht Gesellschaft - Silent Night Society promotes the use of all six verses (usually only 3 are sung), which in the words of Silent Night Society president "[encourage] peace and [demand] responsibility for the globe."
