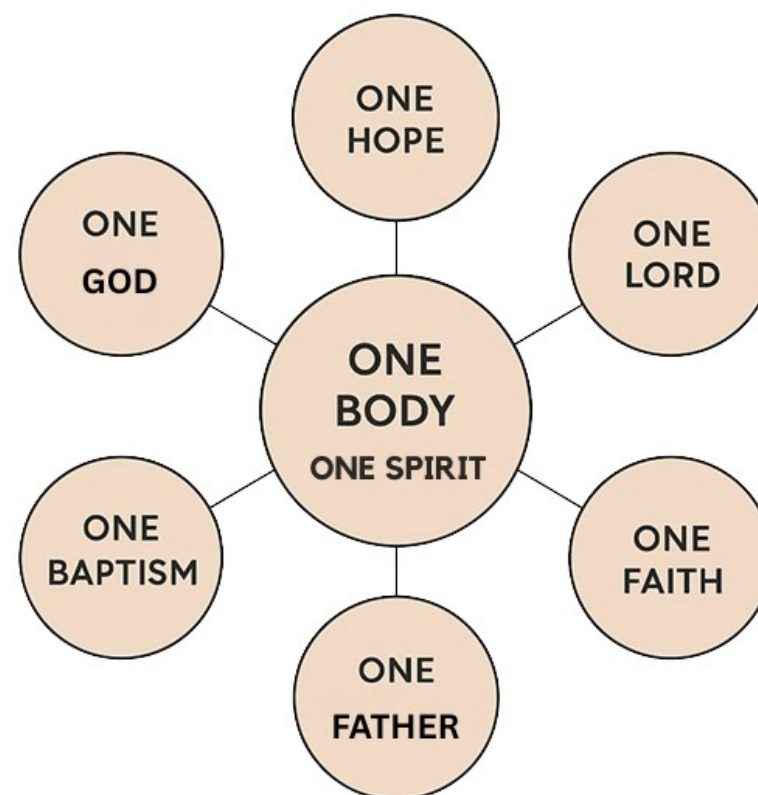

Introduction to the Course

Ephesians 4:4-6: There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.



In a world of diverse, often divided traditions and expressions of Christian faith, Ephesians 4 reminds us that all believers are part of the 'one body' of Christ. A common commitment to the core truths of the Christian faith and a powerful witness to the Holy Spirit's transformative power.

Session 1: One Body & One Spirit

Lent invites us to rediscover our belonging to the Body and our dependence on the Spirit.

Session 2: One Hope

Hope shapes our lives, our endurance, and is communal; we share the same promised future in Christ.

Session 3: One Lord

Lent calls us to re-align our loyalties and surrender rival "lords": status, comfort, control. Confessing Christ as Lord is both worship and obedience.

Session 4: One Faith & One Baptism

Lent is a time of remembering baptismal identity and renewing faith

Session 5: One God & Father of All

Lent draws us back to God as Father: source of life, unity, and identity.

Words to Ponder:



"Hope is praying for rain, but faith is bringing an umbrella" - Unknown

How confident are you in the things you hope for? Are they just mere pipe dreams or do you believe that they can be something more solid? The quote above from an unknown source makes me stop and think about where my hope lies and the basis behind that hope.

Like most people I hope to see a fairer world, I hope that those I love lead happy and fulfilled lives, I hope I don't get another speeding ticket ...

But how confident am I in those hopes? What faith do I have in those things coming to fruition? Well for the latter I can clearly do something practical can't I? Simply slow down and pay attention to the prevailing surroundings, but for the others I have to have faith that they will happen, I have to believe.



However, maybe those situations aren't that different after all, perhaps by slowing down and looking at the world around us in more detail we can give ourselves an umbrella in the rain and in turn allow our hopes to become reality? Just something to ponder.

The annual Carols at The Rock Tavern was a great night. Carols were sung lustily, lots of Christmas jokes laughed or groaned at, quiz questions answered and the pub filled with joy and laughter. Once again many thanks to Ken for leading this and to Daryll, our Pioneer leader for his Christmas message to round off the evening.

It was wonderful to welcome so many people who joined us in these celebrations and we hope that you will not leave it till December to be with us again.



Billy Connolly is calling for a shift in what we choose to pay attention to

Rather than endless coverage of shallow fame and reality TV nonsense, he argues that we should be giving more space to ordinary, decent people who quietly do good things. He believes we spend far too much time celebrating stupidity, while ignoring **kindness, effort, and integrity.**

It's not about being naïve or preachy. Billy's point is practical: if we want things to improve, we have to improve what we value. Reading about good people, talking about positive actions, and recognising those who make a difference helps shape the kind of society we become.

At its heart, it's a warning as much as a hope. If we don't raise our standards and take responsibility for the culture we consume and promote, we risk going backwards rather than forwards.

A thoughtful reminder from Billy Connolly that progress starts with what we choose to notice and celebrate.

I attended Elaine Maclean's's funeral down on Bramston street (a lovely service taken by Allan W). I went because even though I had only known Elaine for a short while, she had been the first person to greet me when I sat down for the first time at Upper Edge. When New Road Sunday school closed I went to nearly all the churches in the area to try to find a new 'home'. When I went to Upper Edge Elaine insisted that I sat next to her - what a lovely lady. So you have Elaine to blame for my continued presence with you all. Also thank you to everyone who has made me feel at home.

While at the service there was a board in the chapel with a list of all the men from the Brighthouse branch of the St John's Ambulance brigade who had served in the First World war, and on that board was my grandad Raymond Reeds. He was from Bailiffe Bridge, was the ambulance man at Firth's carpets and a staunch Methodist at Ebenezer church in Bailiffe Bridge. He served as a medic in that war and was at the Somme. He never said anything about his war time service. (He always called Bailiffe bridge- " Belly brig" I am not sure of how you spell it)

When my mum died I inherited from her a Lord Wharton bible that my grandad was presented with in 1912. To get one of these bibles you had to learn off by heart 20 passages of scripture! In later years that was reduced to 10 passages. Lord Philip Warton made his money from the mines in Swaledale, which is an area where we have been lucky enough to spend quite a lot of time. My brother in law used to have a holiday cottage in a hamlet called Satron, between Gunnerside and Muker, and when it was not being used we used to stay there.

There is a very nice but expensive pub in Low Row (a village

near Gunnerside) and the church in that village was paid for and built by Lord Wharton.

I was preparing a Sunday service for use at New Road and I picked up my grandad's Lord Wharton bible to look for the passage about the parable of the sower, and there in his bible he had highlighted the actual passage that I was going to use, and nowhere else in his bible are there any annotations at all!!!

God moves in a mysterious way.
